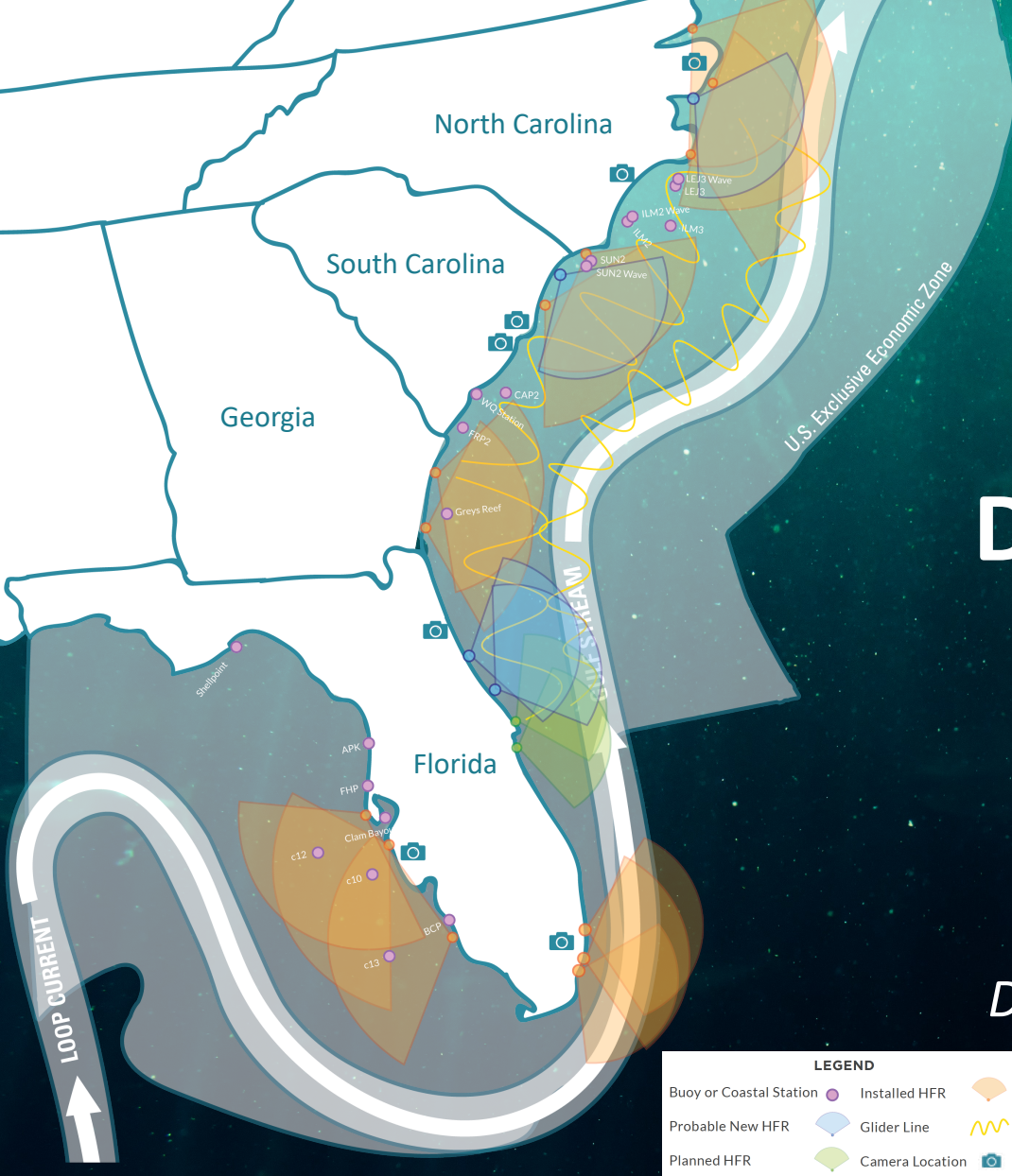

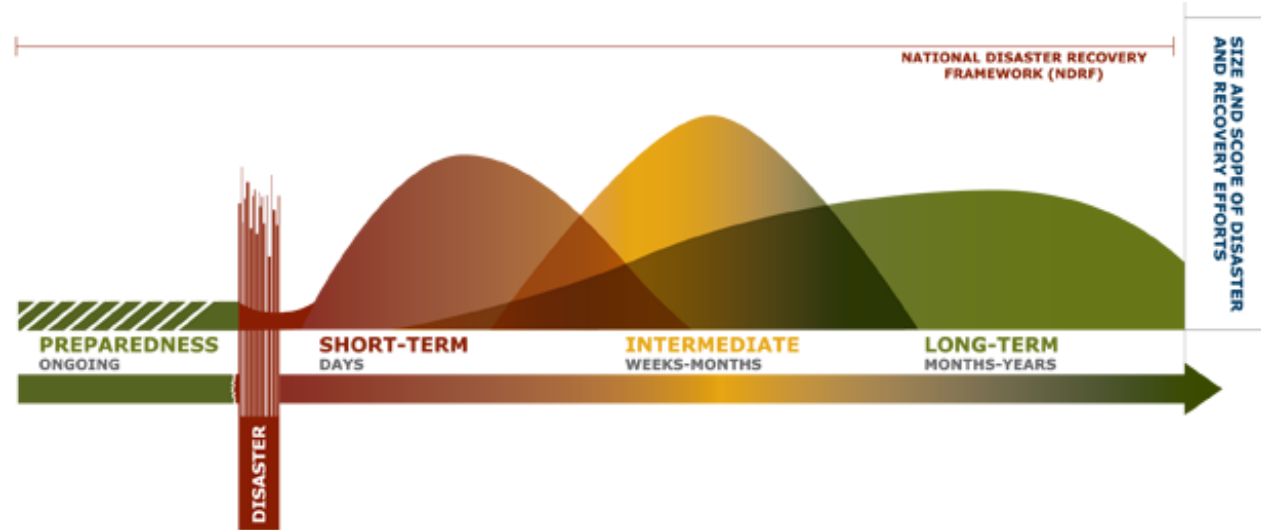

- Build capacity for disaster recovery in Southeastern states in public and private sectors

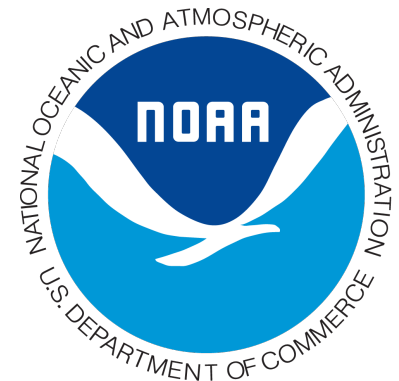


SECOORA Focus Area

- Coastal Hazards

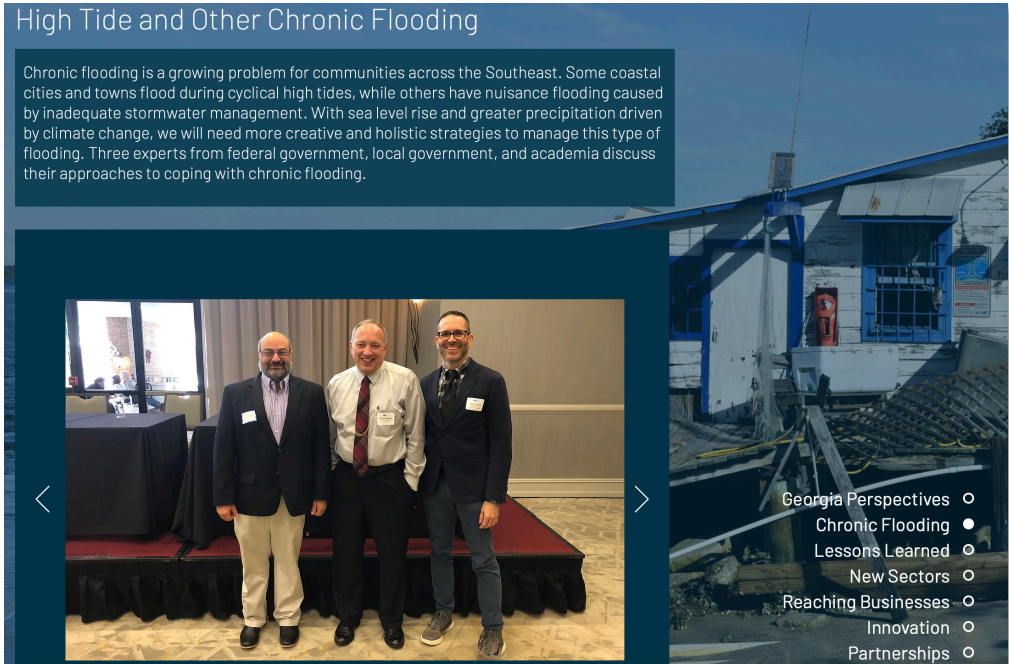
Approach
